2022 Highlights

January

The libraries in Lincoln and Pelham eliminate fines to remove barriers for all and increase access.

March

March Break was a huge success, with life-size Candy Land, Harry Potter Day, and STEAM activities at all branches.

May

All LPPL branches hung red dresses on May 5 to bring awareness to Murdered and Missing Indigenous Women, Girls, and Two-Spirit People (2SMMIWG).

February

The first annual Adopt a Plant Day in Fonthill paired more than 100 people with a new houseplant to take home.

April

On April 1, the library officially became Lincoln Pelham Public Library. The community greenhouse opened at the Rittenhouse Branch with an Earth Day celebration.

June

A pollinator garden was planted in Vineland in partnership with the NPCA. The permanent StoryWalk® opened at Hilary Bald Park in Beamsville. Open houses celebrated the newly formed library system.





July

The permanent StoryWalk® opened at Woodstream Park in Fonthill.

September

LPPL marked Truth and Reconciliation Day with art workshops, wampum beading, and drumming provided by Music for the Spirit from Six Nations of the Grand River, in partnership with Downtown Bench Beamsville.

November

Trivia Night returned at the Fenwick Firehall and raised \$4,500. Thanks to all businesses and volunteers who helped out!

August

Summer reading wrapped up with barbecues in Fonthill and Beamsville celebrating 339,451 minutes read!

October

The first event of the Books on the Bench author series with Adam Shoalts raised \$4,200. Thanks to our sponsors: The Jacob Senior Living, Vineland Foodland, and Calamus Estate Wines.

December

The library announced the addition of snowshoes, C-pens, and CO2 monitors to the Library of Things.
